TO: COUNTY REFUGEE COORDINATORS

SUBJECT: DISCRETIONARY GRANT APPLICATION PROCESS

Following is an option in regard to the process for applying for future discretionary funding (reference the enclosed Refugee Coordinator Letter #04-03, dated March 2, 2004). We would like your input on this proposed option as soon as possible as the announcement for the Targeted Assistance (TA) Discretionary Grant is anticipated to be released in the near future.

Option

In the event the amount of discretionary funding awarded to California is considerably lower than anticipated, two or three counties/projects would be funded. This would be determined using the following criteria:

- If the grant is employment focused, the determination would be based on each counties performance for entered employment as measured in the most recent four Quarterly Performance Reports submitted by the Refugee Programs Bureau to the federal Office of Refugee Resettlement.
- If the grant's focus is not of a measureable area, individual proposals will be scored and the top counties/projects will be funded based on the criteria outlined in the funding announcement.

Please contact the RPB by **March 31, 2006** with your input on this option.

We would also like to take this opportunity to encourage counties to begin looking at the needs in the counties and begin developing ideas on how best to address those needs in preparation of this year's TA Discretionary Grant.

TO: COUNTY REFUGEE COORDINATORS

SUBJECT: DISCRETIONARY GRANT PROCESS DETERMINATION

In September and November of 2003, the Refugee Programs Bureau (RPB) requested input from the County Refugee Coordinators regarding the discretionary grant application process. The federal Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) has recently changed the process for submitting an application for Targeted Assistance Discretionary funding to a single state application. California will no longer be allowed to submit individual proposals from separate counties or organizations. In preparation for future discretionary grants, and based on input from the county refugee coordinators, the state will coordinate a single state application for future discretionary grant announcements as described below.

After an announcement for a discretionary funding opportunity is released by ORR, the RPB will solicit one proposal from each impacted county. The amount of funding that the RPB requests will take into consideration the amount available nationwide and the need expressed by the counties. Each impacted county will be allotted an equal amount proportionate to the amount awarded to California. For instance, if California is awarded \$900,000 and only nine counties have agreed to participate, each county would receive \$100,000. If the grant announcement targets a specific group, each impacted county will be allotted an amount using a specific methodology. For instance, the elder grant uses the total number of refugees over 60 years old in each county to determine the amount of funding each county receives.

This process change will only apply to discretionary grants that are non-continuation or are the first year of a continuation grant. Subsequent years of continuation grants will not be affected by this process as continuation funding is based on merit and performance, and amounts and participation are determined by ORR.

As each funding announcement is released by ORR, the RPB will transmit a copy of the announcement and specific guidelines to impacted counties to prepare their request to participate in the funding application. Only one proposal will be allowed from each impacted county. This will enable the counties to consult with their communities and coordinate services to be provided. If counties determine they are unable to participate in the application, that portion of the grant will be allocated evenly among the participating counties. The RPB will then compile the information received by the counties into a single state application.

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This is an excellent opportunity to look closely at the needs in your communities and begin to prepare for future funding opportunities. You may wish to consult with your service providers to determine what services are needed or what services need enhancements in anticipation of future discretionary grants.
